

The Immigrants Creed

Presider Let us affirm our faith together:

People I believe in God, who guided the people in exile and in exodus, the God of Joseph, Moses and Miriam in Egypt and Daniel in Babylon, the God of foreigners and immigrants.

I believe in Jesus Christ, a displaced Galilean, who was born away from his people and his home, who fled his country with his parents when his life was in danger, and returning to his own country suffered the oppression of the tyrant Pontius Pilate, the servant of a foreign power, who then was persecuted, beaten, and finally tortured, accused and condemned to death unjustly. But on the third day, this scorned Jesus rose from the dead, not as a foreigner but to offer us a larger citizenship in God.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the eternal immigrant from God’s kingdom among us, who speaks all languages, lives in all countries, and reunites all races.

I believe that the church is the secure home for the foreigner and for all believers who constitute it, who speak the same language and have the same purpose.

I believe that the Communion of the Saints begins when we accept the diversity of the saints.

I believe in the forgiveness, which makes us all equal, and in the reconciliation, which identifies us more than does race, language or nationality.

I believe that in the Resurrection, God will unite us as one people in which all are distinct and all are alike at the same time.

Beyond this world, I believe in Life Eternal in which no one will be an immigrant but all will be citizens of God's kingdom, which will never end. Amen.

People **Help us remember to follow Him.**

Leader We know that it does not matter what we believe;
People **Help us to realize the difference our belief makes in our life and the lives we touch.**

Leader **We know it is not Sunday but Monday that is when our work begins.**
People Help us, your people, to be your witness in the world by our choices and our values, no matter what our daily tasks might be.

Leader **As we care for one another, let us share our joys, sorrows, and concerns concluding with “This is my prayer” to which we will respond, “Amen.”**

Our Eucharistic Prayer was written by the members of The Dream of God adult education class that was held during February and March 2005. The class design and content was based on the book by the same title, authored by Dr. Verna J. Dozier, a nationally recognized biblical scholar and teacher and member of St. Mark's Church. In her book, Verna contends that humans are called to live into the kingdom of God – that state of existence of God's justice and love – but that all (and that includes the church) have settled for much less. Verna writes, "We have all failed the dream of God" and that "The terribly patient God still waits." This Eucharistic Prayer expresses the principal themes of Verna's book, expressing God's longing for us and our hope in God. – Paul Roberts Abernathy, 11th Rector

Presider On the night he gave himself over to suffering and death, Jesus gathered with his friends and followers. He took bread. Giving thanks, he broke the bread and gave it to them, saying, "Take. Eat. This is my Body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

After this, Jesus took the cup of wine. Giving thanks, he gave it to his friends, saying, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the New Covenant, poured out for you and for all. Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

May we come to your Table with open hands and open hearts to receive this spiritual food and drink of bread and wine. By the grace of this sacramental meal, return us to your dream of justice and love and restore in us the strength to serve the world in Jesus' name.

All Risen Christ, be known to us in partaking of the bread and in the sharing of the cup.

Presider Accept, O God, our prayers through Jesus the Christ, both our dreamer and your dream incarnate, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, we, your Church, lift our voices in praise.

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The Rev. Cannon Stephanie Spellers

The Rev. Canon Stephanie Spellers serves as the Presiding Bishop's Canon for Evangelism, Reconciliation and Creation, helping Episcopalians to follow Jesus and foster loving, life-giving and liberating relationships with God, each other and the earth. The author of *Radical Welcome: Embracing God, The Other and the Spirit of Transformation* and *The Episcopal Way* (with Eric Law), she has directed mission and evangelism work at General Theological Seminary and in the Diocese of Long Island; founded The Crossing, a ground-breaking church within St. Paul's Cathedral in Boston; and led numerous churchwide renewal efforts. A native of Frankfort, Kentucky, and a graduate of both Episcopal Divinity School and Harvard Divinity School, she makes her home today in New York's Harlem neighborhood.

The Rt. Rev. Carl Walter Wright

7th Bishop Suffragan for Armed Forces and Federal Ministries

A native of Baltimore, Maryland, Wright was elected Bishop Suffragan at the Fall 2016. Wright has been active in the Episcopal Church both as a civilian priest and an Air Force Chaplain. Wright enlisted in the US Air Force in 1978. Following his initial enlistment Wright was commissioned as an Infantry Officer in the Maryland Army National Guard, and U.S. Army Reserve.

In 1993 Wright was commissioned as a Chaplain, US Air Force until his retirement as a Lieutenant Colonel in 2011. At the outbreak of the Persian Gulf War, he was sent to minister to military inmates at the US Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He next served as Rector of another historic African American parish, Saint Mark's Church, Charleston, South Carolina. While in Charleston, Carl received the call to become an active duty Air Force chaplain. He has served in this capacity since August 1993. His assignments included Iraq, Kuwait, Turkey, Germany, Korea, California, Montana, Texas, Utah, and Louisiana. In all of these locations he has taken a very active part in the life of the dioceses. The culmination of Carl's military ministry was his assignment to the Air Force Theater Hospital, Balad Air Base, Iraq in 2006. There he ministered to wounded soldiers and Iraqis. To this day, he keeps the names of the soldiers whose deaths he attended in his Bible. Wright's last active duty assignment was as the Deputy Command Chaplain, USAF Global Strike Command, Barksdale AFB, Louisiana. Air Force Global Strike Command provides combat-ready forces to conduct strategic nuclear deterrence and global strike operations in support of combatant commanders.

Wright attended Loyola University where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Theology. He then attended Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, VA graduating with a Master of Divinity after which he was ordained a Priest in the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland. Wright furthered his theological education earning a Master of Sacred Theology from the School of Theology at the University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee. His STM thesis is entitled, "The Episcopal Church and the Hope of Communion". Prior to being elected Bishop Suffragan, Wright served as Rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Pasadena, Maryland and was named Archdeacon in the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland by Bishop Eugene Sutton. He was elected and served as the 43rd Co-Dean of the Union of Black Episcopalians. He has authored several articles on Church History and has lectured on the challenges of ministry as a military chaplain in combat.
